Here are some things to consider:

• Time

- How long do you keep them and how often do you feed them?
- Location
 - Where will you keep them?
- Family Pets
 - What do you need to consider for your pets at home?
- Failure to Thrive

How to Prepare

- Carrier
 - Depending on their age, kittens can be kept in a top open carrier, play pen or bathtub
- Fleece blankets
- Kitchen scale and notebook to monitor kitten growth
- Heating Disc or Heating Gel
- Kitten Milk Replacement
 - KMR
 - Breeder's Edge
- Bottles/ Syringes
- Miracle Nipples
- Tissue or cotton pads / Litter and shallow litter pan
- Small plush toys
- Wet food/ dry food

Kitten Assessment

- Kittens Age and Overall Health •
- Log Growth





- pink in color, umbilical cord attached, eyes closed
- 97 degrees; can't regulate temp.
- WEEK
- eves closed, ears folded, no umbilical cord eves open at 8-12 days
- · eyes completely open, blue color
- · wobbly on their feet

• incisors emerging, ears



| AGE | WEIGHT | AMOUNT PER FEEDING | SCHEDULE |
|-----------|---------------|------------------------------------|-----------------|
| 0-1 week | 75-150 grams | 2-6 ml | Every 2 hours |
| 1-2 weeks | 150-250 grams | 6-10 ml | Every 2-3 hours |
| 2-3 weeks | 250-350 grams | 10-14 ml | Every 3-4 hours |
| 3-4 weeks | 350-450 grams | 14-18 ml | Every 4-5 hours |
| 4-5 weeks | 450-550 grams | 18-22 ml | Every 5-6 hours |
| 5-8 weeks | 550-850 grams | (weaning; offer ample wet food) | Every 6 hours |


Kitten Care

• Stimulate

- Bottle Feed
- Clean Faces and No Fleas Please!
- Monitor, Log... and Repeat!



Stimulating



- Healthy Poop- brownish/yellow and solid
- Diarrhea is deadly- dehydrates kittens and may be the source of an underlying issue
- Litter training- leave a litter box out at 3 weeks old

Feeding



- Always feed kittens on their stomach
- Never feed a kitten when they are cold
- Nipple flow
- Formula consistency and temperature
- Amount
- Never use cow's milk or dairy products

Keeping Clean



- Always wipe kittens' faces after feeding them
- Make sure to clean kittens well after stimulating
- Young kittens cannot get flea treatment
 - Flea comb
- Quick and warm baths
 - Followed by heat source



- OC Animal Care provides medical care
- URI (cold), deworming, vaccinations, ringworm, scabies, ear mites, etc
- Routine Care Timeline:
 - Routine FVRCP and dewormer every 2-3 weeks
 - Spay/Neuter at 2 lbs and 2 months old
